Friday – February 7, 2014 – 7 p.m. C.G. Jung and Hildegard of Bingen...Soulmates?

Lecture by **Peg Monaghan-Shannon** Fee: \$8-members, \$12-non-members

Visionary, musical composer, writer, medical doctor, counselor, theologian, abbess — Hildegard of Bingen, Benedictine nun of the 12th Century was all of these things. What accounts for her sudden popularity 800 years later in such disparate circles as the New Age movement and the Catholic Church? Jung was familiar with Hildegard, describing her as "an outstanding personality quite apart from her mysticism."

In this interactive and multimedia presentation we will look at the life of Hildegard of Bingen, examine connections to Carl Jung and together ponder the question: What does the rise of cultural interest in Hildegard mean, synchronistically, for our present age?

Peg Monaghan-Shannon has studied Jung and recorded her dreams since 1976. She holds a Master's Degree in psychology, a certificate as a Spiritual Director and was a member of the Jungian Study Group through the Jung Institute in Denver for five years. Interest in Hildegard drew her to pilgrimage to the Birthing Visions Conference in Rudesheim, Germany, in 2013. Peg is a member of the Jung Society and on staff at St. Patrick Church as Servant for Pastoral Care.

Friday, March 14, 2014 – 7 pm Wisdom of Changes Richard Wilhelm & The I Ching

This evening will be a film by Bettina Wilhelm, granddaughter of Richard Wilhelm. The film gives the history Richard Wilhelm, a man who spent more than 20 years as a Christian missionary in China, but who never converted one person to Christianity. He became deeply immersed in the old Chinese Culture and worked with a Chinese scholar to translate the I Ching, The Book of Changes. It is the story of a deeply introverted and spiritual man in his search to find his own soul. When he returned to Europe, he met Carl Jung. They became close colleagues and friends as Jung became a student of the I Ching.

Friday, April 11, 2014 – 7 p.m. The Re-Emergence of the Sacred Presented by Dr. Donna Cozort,

Jungian Analyst Fee: \$8-members, \$12-non-members

The presentation will be a story about trauma and the terror and treachery of coping with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) as well as the challenging journey back to life. It is the story of a relationship between two strong and caring women: Mary, a former combat nurse, re-living all the horror and despair of her experiences in the Vietnam War, and her Jungian analyst, Dr. Donna Cozort (the presenter), who helped Mary to unearth, integrate, and learn from the brutal memory she'd kept at bay for twenty-six years. Dr. Cozort will tell Mary's story as she experienced it -- piecing together the fragments of Mary's history, struggling to contain Mary's terrors, and gradually recognizing, by way of dreams, reactions, and intuition that Mary's

psychological state might yield to its amplified reflection in the biblical story of Job. A series of Mary's real life pictures both before and after her trauma along with her revealing pictures will also be shown. Anyone treating trauma, especially PTSD will find this personally moving and spiritually discerning account of the therapeutic process as it unfolds in time most enlightening.

Donna Cozort is a clinical psychologist and Jungian analyst in Dallas. A Diplomate of the C.G. Jung Institute of Zurich, Dr. Cozort is a training analyst for the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts, where she served as Director of Training for four years. She is the professional sponsor of the Jung Society of North Texas and a member of the Dallas Institute, AGAP and IAAP. Her book, Out of the Whirlwind: PTSD & the Archetype of Job, documents her experience in treating trauma and PTSD.

Friday, May 16, 2014 – 7 pm
Exploring the Archetypes: Divine
Doorways into the Unconscious Hermes,
God of Thievery and Commerce
Presented by Sharon Coggan, Ph.D.

Jung's core concept of archetypes as energy forms in consciousness is explored through a focus on classical religion. We will meet the twelve Olympians, note their archetypal resonances, and zero in on one particularly compelling deity, Hermes, God communication. He is seen everywhere today, as people are transfixed by their methods of electronic communication. Hermes, God of thieves, was born at dusk and had stolen the cattle of Apollo before dawn. His story is wonderfully entertaining, yet profound. As the element mercury, named for his Latin counterpart, is tricky and belies appearances, so is the God whose name it bears. remains in-between, its freezing and melting points being very low and high. It appears so smooth and sensual, yet handling it can poison us! Thus, Hermes signifies the in-between state, and clearly the dark side is well represented. Hermes was deemed the God of communication, and everything else that happens in the inbetweens. Most importantly, he functions as the agent of transformation of consciousness, so important in Jungian thought that Jung dedicated an entire essay to it, "The Spirit Mercurius". This exploration of a rich archetype of the European legacy will helpfully whet the appetite of our audience to want to explore further the vast wealth offered in classical mythology.

Sharon L. Coggan, Ph.D. earned a Master of Theological Studies from Harvard Divinity School, a Master of Arts in Religious Studies from Stanford University, and the Ph,D. in Religious Studies from Syracuse University. She teaches at the University of Colorado Denver. where she serves as Associate Professor, Clinical Teaching Track, and as Director of the Religious Studies Program. She serves on the Board of Directors of the C. G. Jung Society of Colorado. She is currently writing a book on themes in early Christianity and Greek religion. In the Jungian area, she teaches classes on: Myth and Symbol, Classical Mythology, Perspectives on Dream Analysis, and the Hero's Journey.
