Friday Evening Lecture

September 16th, 7 - 9 pm

at Colorado College - Loomis Hall

In Dr. Aizenstat's lecture, participants will learn about "*The Global Dream Initiative*." This advocacy calls for a recognition of the trauma in the natural and urban landscapes along with the need to participate in their healing. Here we discover that the world's suffering appears in the living images of people's dreams. Simply said, "people can become depressed because nature is depressed".

The Global Dream Initiative develops a forum to see and hear the world's dreams. We also will learn how to begin utilizing these dreams to create new and more generative methods of attending to the growing perils facing nature.

Saturday Workshop

September 17th, 9am - 3pm

at Colorado College - Gaylord Hall

In this workshop, we'll go deeper into the theme of Friday evening to learn how nature enters into our dreams and asks us for our engagement. Dr. Aizenstat invites you into an innovative approach to dream work. Through story and example, he'll share Dream Tending methods that feature a process of discovery in which dreamers become "naturalists" of the psyche, observing the activity of the images in their unfolding dreamscape. He'll experiment with a worldview that playfully and soulfully sees the world as alive and always dreaming while also advocating that we go to the very depths of experience, to the level of the anima mundi — the soul of and in the world — and listen. At this level of experience we engage the voices of the world's dreams, effortlessly arising and speaking on their own behalf and asking for response. The "call to action" that emerges from the dreaming psyche is in service to the landscapes we hold dear.

Stephen Aizenstat, PhD, is the Chancellor and Founding President of Pacifica Graduate Institute, and Professor of Depth Psychology. He has a Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology and is a credentialed public schools teacher and a counselor. Dr. Aizenstat has explored the power of dreams through depth psychology and his own research for more than 35 years. His Dream Tending methodologies extend traditional dream work to the vision of an animated world where the living images in dream are experienced as embodied and originating in the psyche of Nature as well as that of persons. His book, ***Dream Tending***, describes multiple new applications of dreamwork in relation to health and healing, nightmares, the World's Dream, relationships, and the creative process.

In fairy tales, it is the wicked/mean/evil stepmother who takes the rap. Perhaps it would be too traumatizing to tell the tale, “Once upon a time, the children’s mother convinced their father to take them out to the woods and abandon them.” Can we even approach “The Bad Mother”? In this presentation we will attempt to look at her in a more nuanced light than childhood terror can apprehend. We will see her from different angles, illustrated from Jung’s writings, literature and movies. We will consider her fate and (im)possible (?) redemption.

Puddi Kullberg, MA, LPC, Jungian Analyst, has been a psychotherapist based in Colorado Springs for thirty years. She trained to become a Jungian Analyst through the former Denver Jung Seminar of the Inter-Regional Society of Jungian Analysts, from which she graduated in 2012. She is a member of the C.G. Jung Institute of Colorado where she teaches and participates in some aspects of analyst training. She is also on the Boards of the Inter-Regional Society and the Jung Society of Colorado Springs. Puddi has been interested in “The Bad Mother” for many years because this image was constellated decades ago in her own life. She has struggled personally to come to terms with it, and she has worked with clients for whom this is also an issue. Puddi has seen “The Bad Mother” as though through a prism, as a many faceted phenomenon.

He will be drawing on the imagery and wisdom of the Grail Mythology to elucidate Jung’s work on this issue.

Ken Schmitz, LCSW, is a Jungian-based psychotherapist who recently relocated to Colorado from St. Paul, Minnesota. He has led numerous groups of men in the ideas and exercises contained in his book *Search for the Grail: A Man’s Guide for Developing an Inner Life*. The men who have participated in these groups have had remarkable success in learning about their dream lives and in becoming more mature, responsible, and content gentlemen. In addition to his psychological training as a clinical social worker, Ken brings to his work the theological and spiritual background of a former Catholic priest. This enables him to address the spiritual questions and hunger for meaning that lie just below the surface in most men.
